#### **Cascade Ridge Elementary Student Placement Process**

April, 2011

Our staff takes the task of placement very seriously. We assure you that each grade level team (with assistance of specialists, guidance team, etc.) takes much time, effort and care in developing class rosters that result in offering all children a quality educational experience. Following are factors that are taken into consideration as class rosters are developed:

- the program needs of the child
- a balance of academic achievement levels
- behavior factors regarding each student
- social needs and the compatibility of students with others in the classroom (i.e., separating students who have not worked well together in the past)
- independent work habits and leadership skills information provided by the teacher

Once balanced rosters are created and staffing is finalized, teachers will be assigned.

As parents you may have pertinent information about your child that you would like considered in the placement process. Examples of information staff find helpful are: "Please separate my twins, Sally and Suzie," or "Please do not place my son Joey in the same class as Fred as we are neighbors and they are together all the time," or "My child has only been in the United States one month and needs ELL support".

Examples of comments that we all agree upon are: "We want a warm, nurturing, caring environment for our child," "We want our child in a structured classroom". We take these comments as a given; it is each teachers' responsibility to provide a nurturing, challenging, safe environment for every student. The task for the current year teachers is to develop balanced classrooms based on the knowledge they have about the students, not the teachers at the next grade level.

If you choose to provide specific information regarding your child that the teacher does not have or may be unaware of, please provide a written letter in a sealed envelope (**no e-mail will be accepted**) addressed to the Principal. Letters may be mailed to the address below or delivered to the office by parents. <u>WRITTEN LETTERS</u> <u>ARE DUE BY FRIDAY APRIL 29<sup>TH</sup>, 2011.</u> Please note we do not accept letters that specify individual teachers by gender, experience level, or name.

Thank you in advance for your understanding and support of this process and be assured we will so all we can to insure thoughtful placement of each child.

#### MSP Schedule for Testing:

MSP testing will begin Tuesday, May 3<sup>rd</sup>. Third Grade students will take a Reading and Math assessment. Our fourth grade students will have three assessments; Reading, Writing (2 days), and **NEW THIS YEAR-**4th Grade Math will be given online. Fifth graders will have Math and Science assessments using testing booklets, but will take their Reading assessment online. All testing will start first thing in the morning. fast, and is at school on time. Paper and pencil make-up tests will be given through May 17<sup>th</sup> and online make-ups until the end of this testing window, should your child miss school or arrive too late to take a test.

If you are volunteering in the building during this period, please do not enter any classroom that has a **Testing-Do Not Enter** document posted on the door. We appreciate your sensitivity to the quiet, testing environment we provide during MSP.

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#### When to Keep Your Child Home from School; Communicable Disease Guidelines

KEEP YOUR CHILD HOME IF HE/SHE HAS ANY OF THESE SYMPTOMS:

**Fever** – over 100 degrees F. orally. Temperature should remain normal (98.6 degrees) for 24 hours before returning to school

Sore throat - especially if associated with fever or swollen glands

**Vomiting** – within the past 24 hours

Diarrhea - more than one occurrence in a 24 hour period

Drainage from the eye -the eye crusted and difficult to open (especially upon waking)

**Nasal discharge (yellow or greenish)** –If your child's nasal mucus has a color and is accompanied by a fever and/or coughing, sneezing, drowsiness, and general signs of not feeling well, your child may be contagious and should remain at home until the symptoms subside. Call your doctor if you have any concerns or questions.

Appearance/Behavior – unusually tired, pale, lack of appetite, difficult to wake, confused

Rash - body rashes not associated with heat, or allergic reactions to medications

Head lice - contact school office or nurse if any indication of head lice or nits

<u>VERY IMPORTANT</u> - Remember to keep the school updated with new phone numbers and emergency contacts in case your student becomes ill at school. Any questions please call your school nurse.

The most important thing you can do to prevent illness is for you and your child to wash your hands often with warm water and soap.

#### **REMINDER TO VOLUNTEERS:**

It is important to both sign in when you arrive at school **and** sign out when leave. It is imperative that we know at all times who is in the building in case of emergency/disasters.
